WHAT IS ECOP CANADA?

Early Career Ocean Professionals (ECOP) is an international program endorsed by the UN Ocean Decade to elevate and strengthen the diverse perspectives of new generations of ocean professionals.

The Canada Node was started in 2021 by three ECOPs, Neha Acharya-Patel, Samantha McBeth, and Ronnie Noonan-Birch. Laura Hernandez Merlano, Frankie Marquez, and Jovana Kornicer form the current Steering Committee. On the administrative/implementation team, Ashley Bowes is the National Coordinator and Aneri Garg is the National Program Assistant for ECOP Canada. The Node has an advisory board of 14 ECOPs from various geographical locations, cultures, and professional roles in the ocean space.

The ECOP Canada community primarily exists on Slack, social media, and a newsletter to connect members with jobs, training, funding, leadership, and collaboration opportunities.

ECOP Canada has a network of partner institutions to ensure that the voices and perspectives of a new generation of Canadian ocean professionals are heard and that the vast potential of early-career professions is fully maximized and supported.

VISION

We aim to achieve intergenerational equity by strengthening the diverse voices of early career ocean professionals in all ocean fields across Canada.

MISSION

Through our network of ocean partners and ECOPs, we aim to address the following needs outlined in Canada's Blue Economy Strategy:

Now is the time to take action by supporting the next generation of ocean leaders to meet the goals of the UN Ocean Decade and the 17 Sustainable Development Goals.



ECOP CANADA'S ACCOMPLISHMENTS

After a two years of becoming endorsed an official node to the Global ECOP Program, ECOP Canada has achieved the following milestones:

1 Growth of ECOP Canada Members from all of Canada's coast



ECOP Canada has increased membership of the network to represent early career ocean professionals (ECOPs) from all of Canada's coasts from 190 to 344 members. Through conference attendance, webinars, increased partnerships, and social media programming our membership is consistently growing.

Our rate of growth accelerates as the number of tangible opportunities we provide our membership also increases. This activity was successful since we experienced a 81% increase in growth of ECOP Canada members during the 2023 fiscal year.





2 Led activities that supported the Canadian contribution to the Ocean Decade:

Collaborated with Canada's Ocean Decade Office and the Community of Champions at in-person conferences

This year, as part of our commitment to the UN Ocean Decade, ECOP Canada collaborated with the Canadian Ocean Decade Office led by DFO and the Community of Champions at in-person conferences across Canada to ensure the voices of early career ocean professionals are heard and empowered to support the Canadian contribution to the UN Ocean Decade.



At the ORCA 2023 National Meeting in St. John's, Newfoundland in June 2023, two of ECOP Canada's former steering committee members were both key contributors to the plenary session of the meeting.

On behalf of ECOP Canada, Samantha McBeth presented on the importance of meaningful early career engagement at the plenary session of the conference. She presented tangible steps on how Canadian Ocean organizations can ensure that early career perspectives are valued.

Neha Acharya-Patel was an invited member of the panel that addressed the importance of interdisciplinary and intergenerational collaboration in the context of the UN Ocean Decade. ECOP Canada also co-facilitated participatory sessions with each Canadian Decade Champion on each of the UN Ocean Decade outcomes.

These workshops were well received, and the ECOPs supporting each of the Community of Champions and leading the ECOP dialogue at the sessions distilled key takeaways that were then presented at the closing session of the meeting.

Collaborated with Canada's Ocean Decade Office and the Community of Champions at in-person conferences



At the Coastal Zone Conference in Victoria, BC in June 2023, ECOP Canada collaborated with the Ocean Startup Project, Centre for Ocean Applied Sustainable Technologies (COAST), the Ocean Decade Collaborative Centre for the Northeast Pacific, and Canadian Decade Champion for a Predicted Ocean, Jonathan Kellogg, to deliver a workshop to engage early career ocean professionals on their role in the UN Ocean Decade.

The workshop engaged ECOPs on the <u>10 Ocean Decade Challenges</u> and involved an interactive session for ECOPs and leaders involved in the Ocean Decade to collaboratively brainstorm transformative ocean tech and social solutions that will address the Ocean Decade challenges.

ECOP inclusion in the Community of Champions Working Groups

During the 2023 FY, ECOP Canada continued to support ECOP inclusion in the 7 Ocean Decade Outcome working groups by checking in with the Community of Champions and the ECOPs participating in the working groups to ensure ECOP voices were being heard and empowered to support the Canadian contribution to the Ocean Decade.

Since the Community of Champions platform is also in early stages, the inclusion of ECOPs in the development of the working groups themselves ensures that ECOP voices are heard as the Ocean Decade progresses in Canada.


In July, ECOP Canada hosted an important conversation on Ocean Science Together with Alexandra Anaviapik to early career ocean professionals across Canada and the world. The webinar highlighted the intersection of The UN Ocean Decade and Reconciliation and engaged ECOPs on why it is time to transform the way countries such as Canada approach our relationship with the Ocean, bringing together all perspectives, especially those of Indigenous Peoples who have drawn sustenance from the ocean for thousands of years without compromising the integrity of its ecosystems.

Alex shared her insights and recommendations with the larger ECOP community regarding effective communication skills and making space for the purposeful inclusion of Indigenous people as we work together for the Ocean We Want.

How to be a Community Resilience Warrior in the Face of Ocean Hazards Webinar | Watch here

In October, ECOP Canada teamed up with ECOP U.S. and the Sustainable Ocean Alliance (SOA) to deliver a regional webinar series focused on Ocean Decade Challenge #6: Increase community resilience to ocean hazards. This panel brought together experts from three North American organizations and regions to discuss their experience in addressing community resilience in response to climate-related ocean hazards. One of the panel members included an ECOP based in Canada, Amanda Lim, the Program Manager of Environmental Initiatives.

ECOP Canada supported the Ocean Decade Collaborative Center for the Northeast Pacific with facilitating a series of webinars that aimed to convene conversations among knowledge holders, scientists, practitioners, and community members in the Northeast Pacific region. The series highlights timely topics and advances in ocean science through the lens of the United Nations Decade of Ocean Science for Sustainable Development, grounded in the interests and priorities of coastal communities.

Each Decade Dialogue featured a 30-minute discussion that invited early career ocean professionals participating in the webinar to engage with the panel of speakers and ask career-focused questions. ECOP Canada supported recruiting voluntary members to lead the conversations and facilitate the intergenerational knowledge exchange.



3 Developed the programs to increase ECOP inclusion in Canada's ocean sector

The Career Connector Program



Through the Career Connector Program, ECOP Canada aims to create a platform that will connect organizations and leaders with the skills and knowledge that early career ocean professionals (ECOPs) bring to the ocean space.

During the development of the program, ECOP Canada reached out to our network of early career ocean professionals and identified a need among interested members to develop a work placement package that offers short-term opportunities (6 to 8 weeks) for ECOPs to gain impactful career experiences with various ocean organizations in a variety of ocean fields.

The goal is that through a variety of experiences in the ocean sector, ECOPs can identify the career pathways available to them through immersive experiences and organizations will recognize the talent ECOPs bring to the sector and create long-term career opportunities for ECOPs. Another goal that was identified was the value of a cohort-based program to enable peer-to-peer mentorship and capacity building.

The work placement packages also aim to provide ECOPs with an equitable hourly wage and benefits, to address barriers that ECOPs face when entering the workforce such as:

- A lack of equitable wages and benefits;
- A lack of connections and a support network;
- A lack of understanding about career pathways and professional development opportunities in Canada's ocean sector.

This program supported the inclusion of ECOPs in the ocean sector by identifying barriers for the recruitment of ECOPs, identifying the needs of ECOPs for their success in the sector, liaising with and consulting partners on their needs for including ECOPs and incorporated inclusive practices within the design and development of the program (i.e. advocating for equitable pay and benefits during the program).

The next step for this program is actively applying for multi-year funding as well as building connections with partners/institutions who are interested in offering ECOPs workplace packages and training programs to further develop ECOPs soft and hard skill sets.

Students gained insights into the nature of their work, the challenges they face, and the burning questions that drive their curiosity.

ECOP Canada partnered with Canadian Geographic and SOI's Blue Future Pathways to host an online photo competition that aimed to show how ECOPs in Canada today are the force working towards and promoting ocean sustainability during the UN Ocean Decade.

The photo competition collected and shared visual stories from ECOPs on the diversity of ocean careers that exist in Canada and the people engaged in this meaningful work.

Prizes for the photo competition's winners included sponsorships from SOI's Blue Future Pathways, Canadian Geographic, Canadian Ocean Literacy Coalition, and Hydro Flask.



Ocean People Canada (OPC) Meetings

ECOP Canada partnered with the Sustainable Ocean Alliance (SOA), Ocean Wise, and Ocean Uprise to create "Ocean People Canada" (OPC) which aims to unite Canada's ocean professionals and enthusiasts through a common, quarterly meeting to improve communication, access to information, and identify synergies for collaboration along themes. ECOP Canada worked closely with the core organizers to deliver two meetings in 2023 that engaged early career ocean professionals and organizations across Canada.

The first meeting focused on strategies to apply for Satellite Events at the UN Ocean Conference.

The second meeting hosted in November engaged OPC participants on innovative approaches to pitching and funding projects. The meeting included insights from ECOP Canada members, Frankie Marquez and Bodhi Patil on effective methods for grant applications.

- National Coordinator Ashley Bowes played a key role on the CZC's ECOP Committee to plan engaging activities, speaking and funding opportunities for ECOPs attending the conference.
- In June, Ashley Bowes and former ECOP Canada Steering Committee member, Ronnie Noonan-Birch led and facilitated a workshop that engaged ECOPs on the 10 Ocean Decade Challenges and brainstormed tech and social solutions that could be implemented during the UN Ocean Decade. The workshop brought together new key partners such as the Ocean Startup Project and COAST, which has led to developing future development opportunities for ECOPs as well as increased a strong partnership with the Ocean Decade Collaborative Center for the Northeast Pacific.





Coastal Conference in Victoria, British Columbia

- In October, Frankie Marquez attended the conference, hosted by the BC Métis Federation, to network with ocean professionals who are mostly Indigenous in British Columbia. The engaged professionals focused on conservation and who take part in high-level conversations about the protection and preservation of BC's delicate aquatic ecosystems.
- Frankie presented on ECOP Canada's initiatives and how ocean professionals can empower the voices of early career professionals during the UN Ocean Decade and join the ECOP network.

Climate Week NYC

Since its conception in 2021, ECOP Canada has grown to be recognized as the Early Career Network in Canada's ocean space. This growth and trajectory has been due to the hard work of our founding Steering Committee and Advisory Board. As a result, the opportunity to serve on ECOP Canada's Advisory Board and Steering Committee has also led to growth and new career opportunities for the founding members.

In order to continue meeting ECOP Canada's capacity development goals are met, our founding Advisory Board and Steering Committee members termed to change on a rotational basis with members to serve two-year terms with a maximum of two terms.

The two-year rotation ensures that a new team of ECOPs can bring their strengths and vision to Canada's ocean table while honing their leadership skills. As well as that a diversity of ECOP perspectives are empowered and heard to support a strong Canadian contribution to the UN Ocean Decade.

From June to September 2023, the founding ECOP Canada Advisory Board and Steering Committee members planned their succession and developed a strategy for recruiting and onboarding new Steering Committee and Advisory Board members.

By formalizing the rotational process, ECOP Canada's Advisory Board has grown from 7 founding members to 15 new members with various geographical locations, cultures, and professional roles in the ocean sector. Each member has an assigned role within the board to focus on Communications, Community Engagement, Indigenous Engagement, International Partnerships, Grant Writing, Treasury, and Administration.

On the new Steering Committee, Frankie Marquez, Jovana Kornicer, and Laura Hernandez Merlano bring their leadership experience from diverse backgrounds in the ocean sector ranging from policy, governance, advocacy, funding, storytelling, Indigenous engagement, Equity, Justice, Inclusion, and Accessibility, communications, and grant writing.



8 Hired early career ocean professionals in Canada to support the growth of the network



• National Program Assistant

In September 2023, we hired ECOP Canada member Aneri Garg part-time to support our National Coordinator with social media, communications, programming, webinars, community and partner engagement, grant writing, and conference planning.

• Graphic Designer

ECOP Canada member, Mary Paquet was hired as a contractor to create graphics in French and English highlighting, "How ECOPs view the UN Ocean Decade Outcomes," which are perspectives we gathered while engaging ECOPs at IMPAC5. The graphic is being shared with our partners to amplify the voices of ECOPs and provide tangible solutions to meeting the goals of the Decade Outcomes with intergenerational equity as a priority.

French Translator

ECOP Canada member, Samantha Dimitraki was re-hired as a contractor to translate our communication materials into French. This role is a pivotal part of ensuring we engage with ECOP Canada members who are Francophone and continue to build a network that is inclusive and diverse across Canada.

Sponsorship and Grant Consultants

We hired ECOP Canada advisory board member, Alexa Goodman, and Laura Hernandez Merlano to develop ECOP Canada's Grant and Sponsorship Strategies, and propose a comprehensive funding ecosystem aimed at fortifying the organization's financial resilience and fostering growth. Overall, the strategies provide the required information to position ECOP Canada for sustained success, ensuring its role as a vital catalyst in empowering early career professionals within the ocean sector and blue economy.

The highlight of the week was giving my talk. I felt that it went very well and had great feedback from the audience, as well as discussion with several people during the coffee break afterwards. The PICES BIO committee awarded me best oral presentation! At PICES I was able to update many people on my current work and meet several important people studying zooplankton food webs at the Alaskan Science Center and Fisheries Oceans Canada.

As an ECOP, it can be difficult trying to meet all the people you should at a conference, especially when social situations can be draining. I try to focus on a few people that I want to make a new connection with, usually because their research is closely aligned with mine. After I gave my talk, a few senior scientists approached me later to introduce themselves. When people do that, it is such a relief because it is an opportunity to meet someone who may be working in your region but not your speciality, and you may not have approached on your own. I am grateful to ECOP Canada for the opportunity to attend this conference, as well as all scientists who go out of their way to include early career scientists.

Indigenous Lands and Environment Gathering in Thunder Bay, Ontario



Thanks to the support of ECOP Canada, I was able to attend the Indigenous Lands and Environment Gathering in Thunder Bay, Ontario, hosted by the <u>Friends of the Attawapiskat River</u> and <u>Legal Advocates for Nature's Defence</u>.

The purpose of this conference was for local First Nations' community members and their allies (non-governmental organizations) to discuss the protection of the Attawapiskat river and its watersheds. Specifically, we discussed the development of a Regional Assessment Terms of Reference document, which is intended to guide the federal and provincial governments when conducting environmental impact assessments of proposed mining projects in the Ring of Fire region. It is termed a 'Regional Assessment' because it is not tied to a specific proposed project, but rather an assessment of the cumulative effects that mining development may cause in that region, such as biodiversity loss, destruction of carbon rich peatlands, air and water pollution, and infringement of Indigenous peoples' inherent, Aboriginal and Treaty rights.

This conference allowed me to connect with individuals from a variety of environmental organizations (including Wildlands League, World Wildlife Fund Canada, Mining Watch, and West Coast Environmental Law) and engage directly with community members from various First Nations of the Hudson's Bay/James Bay Lowlands region. I was able to further my understanding of the terrestrial, marine and cultural impacts of mining in the Ring of Fire region, as well as the duty of the provincial and federal governments to obtain the free, prior and informed consent of Indigenous peoples and communities when a proposed project will impact their territories. As an environmental lawyer quite early in my career, attending this conference gave me the opportunity to expand my professional network, learn more about the importance of Indigenous-led conservation, and re-affirm my commitment to advancing environmental justice. When I first became interested in the fishing industry in Quebec, I was keen to understand the issues on the ground about the economic, social and environmental dynamics at play. In order to broaden my horizons in this sector and understand other dynamics in the world, and particularly in my native region Brittany, I found it very relevant to attend conferences at the ITECHMER trade show.

The only professional fishing trade show in France. This event put me right at the heart of the action and issues facing the fishing industry in Brittany, which is very similar to that of Canadian fisheries. I was able to attend round tables presenting points of view and solutions to these issues, and this helped to flesh out my thoughts and guide my next actions to contribute to the transition of fisheries to sustainable fishing.

Meeting the associations that support sustainable fishing also enabled me to continue learning, and to understand the barriers on this industry.

ECOP Canada's contribution not only enables me to attend this highly educational event full of opportunities, it also relieves me of an expense that can be a source of anxiety when you're just starting out in your career. It has really opened up my eyes as someone who has barely left Canada to the rest of the world and the possibilities that exist.

LOOKING AHEAD

ECOP CANADA PROGRAM OBJECTIVES FOR 2024

1. Continue to grow ECOP membership from all of Canada's coasts

ECOP Canada expects to continue growing and mobilizing our network through social media, Slack, and community events. We are actively engaging on these platforms to showcase network diversity and expertise, foster relationships, and adapt communication strategies and story telling to exporse members of our network to opportunities in the Blue Economy.

2. Co-develop Professional Development Opportunities

As part of our commitment to support training opportunities for ECOPs to engage in the Ocean Sector, we are expanding out programming and professional development opportunities. In collaboration with other major Canadian Ocean organizations, we continue to seek opportunities for virtual and in-person trainings. Additionally, we aim to launch the Blue Economy Scholarship, providing unrestriced funding for ECOPs to enhace skills, access resources and pursue specialized trainings.

3. Continue Ocean and Climate Conference & Event Funding

One of the priorities of ECOP Canada is to support ECOP Particiaption at major Ocean and Climate Conferences & Events, enhancing international visibility and contributing to intergenerational equity in the ocean sector. Sponsoring ECOPs facilitates representation at these events, network expansion and connections to foster ocean-climate solutions. We will continue to partner with Canadian Organizations to host in-person networking events at major conference, and support Pan-Canadian ECOP gathering opportunities.

4. Launch Career Connector Pilot Program

One of the mandates of the Global ECOP program is to ensure that ECOP voices are included in decision making conversations. To achieve this we are developing a new program to match ECOPs with appropriate ocean organizations/institutions who are looking for ECOP engagement, exposure to diverse ocean employment opportunities, and address the growing need for skilled employees in the Blue Economy.

5. Continue Growing National and International Partnerships

As ECOP Canada and the Global ECOP program continue to grow we are forging new relationships that will support the long term objectives of both parties. We are currently partnered with multiple national and international organizations such as the Sustainable Ocean Alliance, Canadian Ocean Literacy Coalition, Tula Foundation and the Ocean Decade Collaborative Center for the Northeast Pacific (DCC-NEP), SOI Foundation's Blue Futures Pathways, and Ocean Wise. These partnerships help strengthen our reputation and further develop opportunities for ECOPs through collaboration and co-creation.
